

Antietam Fly Anglers Meeting Minutes 10/14/20

Attendance

Attendance was taken; 9 members were in attendance and 1 guest. (Bill Ruland, Dave Hellane, Pat Brezler, Frank Morrisey, Ken Oldham, Ned Strange, John Hersey, Chris Appleman, Doug Hutzell and guest speaker, Susan Simonson).

Financial Report

Walt Lackenmayr, Treasurer (not present at the meeting) distributed the 10.5.20 Financial Report via e-mail. The balance remains unchanged from the previous September report with a balance of \$1093.03.

Antietam Conococheague Watershed Association Presentation (ACWA) Susan Simonson with support of Doug Hutzell, gave a presentation on ACWA's stream temperature

monitoring during July and August of 2020. Temperature loggers were placed in Little Beaver Creek, Black Rock Creek, Beaver Creek, Mt Aetna Creek and Little Antietam Creek. Other surveys have been taken including benthic sampling, water chemistry analysis and ambient air temperatures. This is all part of a Citizens Science project that document and support decisions made regarding water quality in the watershed. Stream improvement projects can be supported with scientific data. The take away information is that trout thrive in temperatures that do not to exceed 20 degrees Celsius (68 F). On sections of Beaver Creek and the other streams where summer temps exceed 20 C, there is an absence of tree cover. Trees are needed to shade streams to mitigate high summer temperatures. ACWA is looking for opportunities to plant trees along streams in the watershed.

Promoting Antietam Fly Anglers

At the September meeting, Ned Strange took on the task of developing a document (proposed trifold) that promotes the club. Ned with the support of others developed a draft document for review that was met with general approval. Our guest speaker, Susan Simonson, had some worthwhile suggestions such as not to list details of events and people that can change making the document obsolete. Trifolds can be expensive to print so you want to make the document to last. Another suggestion was to consider a rack card in lieu of a trifold. Another suggestion was to ask the question what are we trying to accomplish? That would be to get the information out there that we exist and the benefits membership could bring to them. Perhaps a condensed version of the document we have could be printed as a rack card. The concept seemed to meet with general approval.

Post Office Expenses

Bill Ruland looked into the cost of a P.O. box at the Williamsport P.O. and the price is nearly the same as we currently paying. No savings there.

November Meeting

We will move to a Zoom meeting and hope to have Matt from the Feathered Hook give a presentation. Bill Ruland suggested a practice run to work out the bugs prior to the meeting.

"Small Stream Review"

Author: Al Kyte, in the early 1990's, was among the first group of instructors to organize and oversee the national fly casting instructor's certification program for the then Federation of Fly Fishers. He has taught fly fishing and casting for over 60 years. Target Audience: This book, as explained in the preface, is for folks that already know what a casting loop is and regards themselves already as fly anglers.

General Approach: He uses pictures, diagrams, and accompanying descriptions to help the casters diagnose their own problems by adjusting four variables: speed, stoke length, angular rotation, and up/down tilt. The book is broken up in three parts: Better Basic Cast, Better Distance Cast, and Better Problem Solving. He also differentiates between casting styles and casting principles, which, more recently, has been championed by Lefty Kreh and Ed Jaworowski in their recent TFO DVD. Yes, I know that it can be difficult to teach yourself fly casting but this book will give you the principles that you can use either by yourself or with an instructor.

Personal Reaction: This book was given to me by my mentor, Bob Stouffer, on St. Patrick's Day, 2012, three years before I became a certified casting instructor. Bob's comment in the book was, "The reading of this small book, its principles and application, can be both life changing and seminal." I couldn't say it any better. This book has been foundational for me as a fly fisherman and fly casting instructor and it means the world to me that Bob gave it to me. The satisfaction I receive from a well-executed cast by either myself or one of my students continues to enthrall me unabated since that day over eight years ago.
